How does it work?

Most organisations complete the Rainbow Flag Award in one year.

Term/Phase One	 Receive LGBT+ inclusion starter training Implement positive LGBT+ inclusion appropriate to your setting Submit one section for review
Term/Phase Two	 Implement positive LGBT+ inclusion appropriate to your setting Submit two sections for review
Term/Phase Three	 Implement positive LGBT+ inclusion appropriate to your setting Submit final three sections for review and complete the process
